To Graduating Seniors:

I enclose a program of Commencement events together with a copy of instructions for the Baccalaureate Service and Class Day Exercises on Sunday, June 14, and the Commencement Exercises on Monday, June 15.

The Baccalaureate Service will be held in Woolsey Hall at 11 A.M. on Sunday, and no tickets are required for guests.

Class Day Exercises will be held Sunday on the Old Campus at 3 P.M., under the direction of the Senior Class Day Committee. In case of heavy rain, the Exercises will be moved to Woolsey Hall.

If you plan to attend the degree-conferring ceremony on Monday, June 15, you should fill out and return the enclosed card before May 20. If you wish to have guests, you may apply for three tickets on the enclosed guest ticket card. Special applications may be made out for a limited number of additional tickets at the Secretary's Office, Woodbridge Hall.

Tickets will be allotted in the order in which applications are received. They will be held for you at the Commencement Information Desk, Sterling Memorial Library, which will be open from 8:30 A.M. to 5 P.M., beginning Monday, June 8. All inquiries before that date should be directed to the Secretary's Office. Tickets will not be held after 9 A.M. on June 15. There are no special invitations prepared for these exercises.

At Commencement the diplomas will be given to student marshals representing the colleges. After the ceremony, the candidates will follow the faculty marshals out of the campus to their colleges, where they will receive their diplomas individually from the masters.

In case of heavy rain the ceremony will be held in the Ingalls Rink, where, because of the large number of candidates, there will be a limited number of seats for guests. Rainy day tickets will accompany your regular guest tickets. Guests who cannot be accommodated in the Rink are invited to go to Woolsey Hall, where amplifiers will bring them the words and music of the ceremony.

The list to which these letters are sent is necessarily preliminary and should not be taken as evidence that a degree will be conferred.
