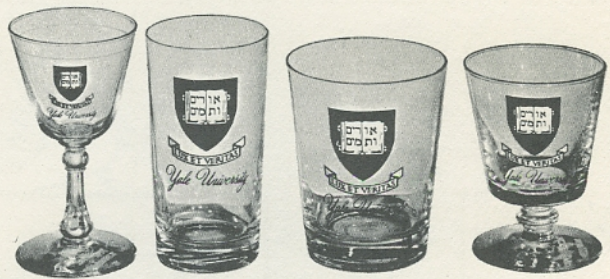

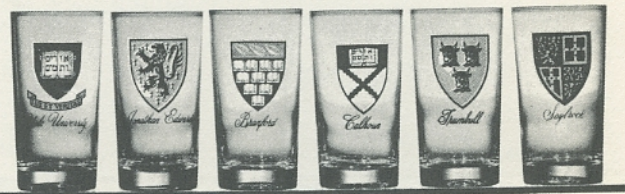

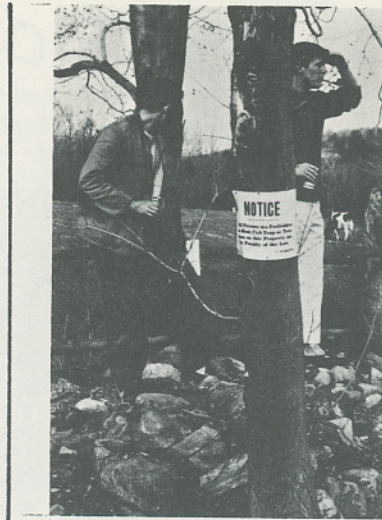
Years ago, Pete Stuhl-

Beer 'n Bikers.

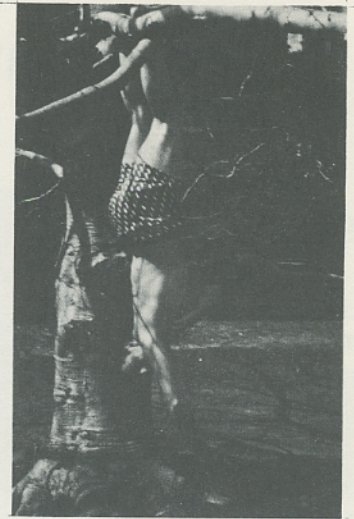

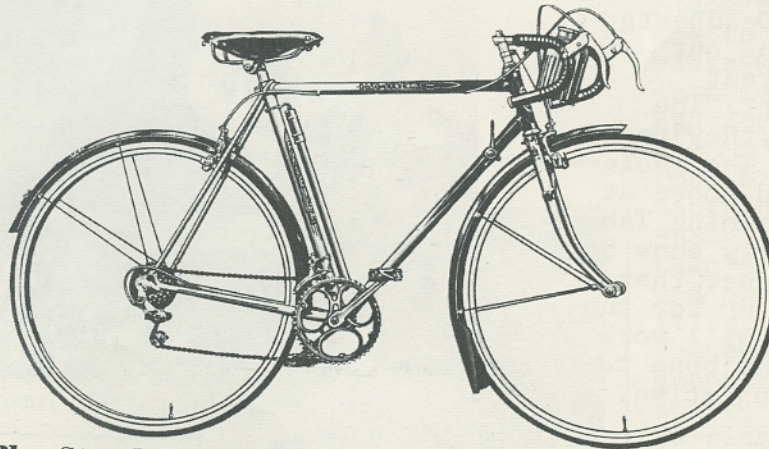

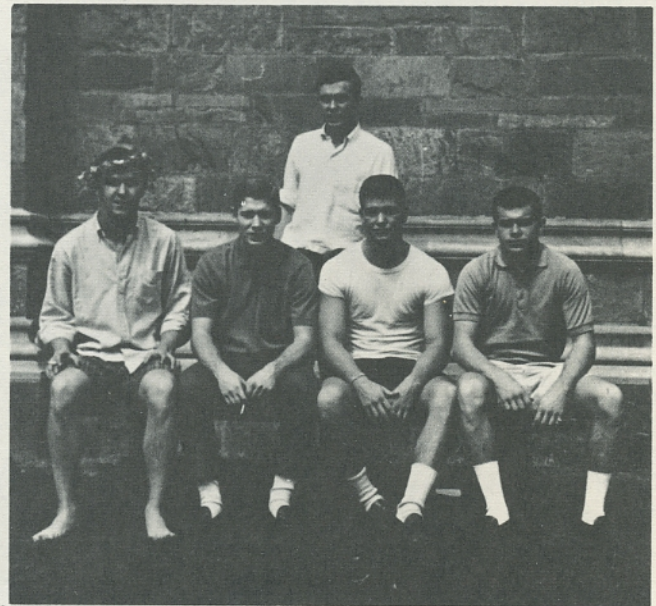

- Lap 1 0.0 start on Elm and York Streets; proceed down Elm to College;
left on College to Prospect
1.8 right onto East Rock Road (caution: dangerous crossing at
Whitney)
2.4 left onto East Rock Parkway
3.5 right onto Davis Road for one block then left onto Ridge Rd.
3.9 right at semaphore onto Hartford Turnpike
7.2 finish of first lap---parking lot of Knudson Bros. Dairy on left.

comments: lap 1 is relatively flat; traffic is heavy with
semaphores and stops

- Lap 2 0.0 proceed on Hartford Turnpike to Yalesville
8.6 finish at second lap---parking lot of Barnes' Ochards to
left across intersection at semaphore

comments: lap 2 is straight but moderately hilly; traffic
is light

- Lap 3 0.0 proceed on Church Street to Chesire (or take detour if
necessary)
4.1 left then immediately right to connect with Route 70
5.3 follow Route 70 through Chesire; right at semaphore for
one block, left for three blocks, then left again
(caution: city traffic, semaphores)
7.0 left onto Route 68
8.4 finish of third lap--gravel pit on right

comments: lap 3 is moderately hilly in spots; traffic is
light except in Chesire

- Lap 4 0.0 proceed on Route 68 to Prospect
2.1 left onto Route 69 at semaphore
5.3 bear right onto Route 63 connector
6.4 left onto Route 63
7.6 finish of fourth lap---small lot near Bethany Airport on right

comments: lap 4 is extremely hilly; traffic light

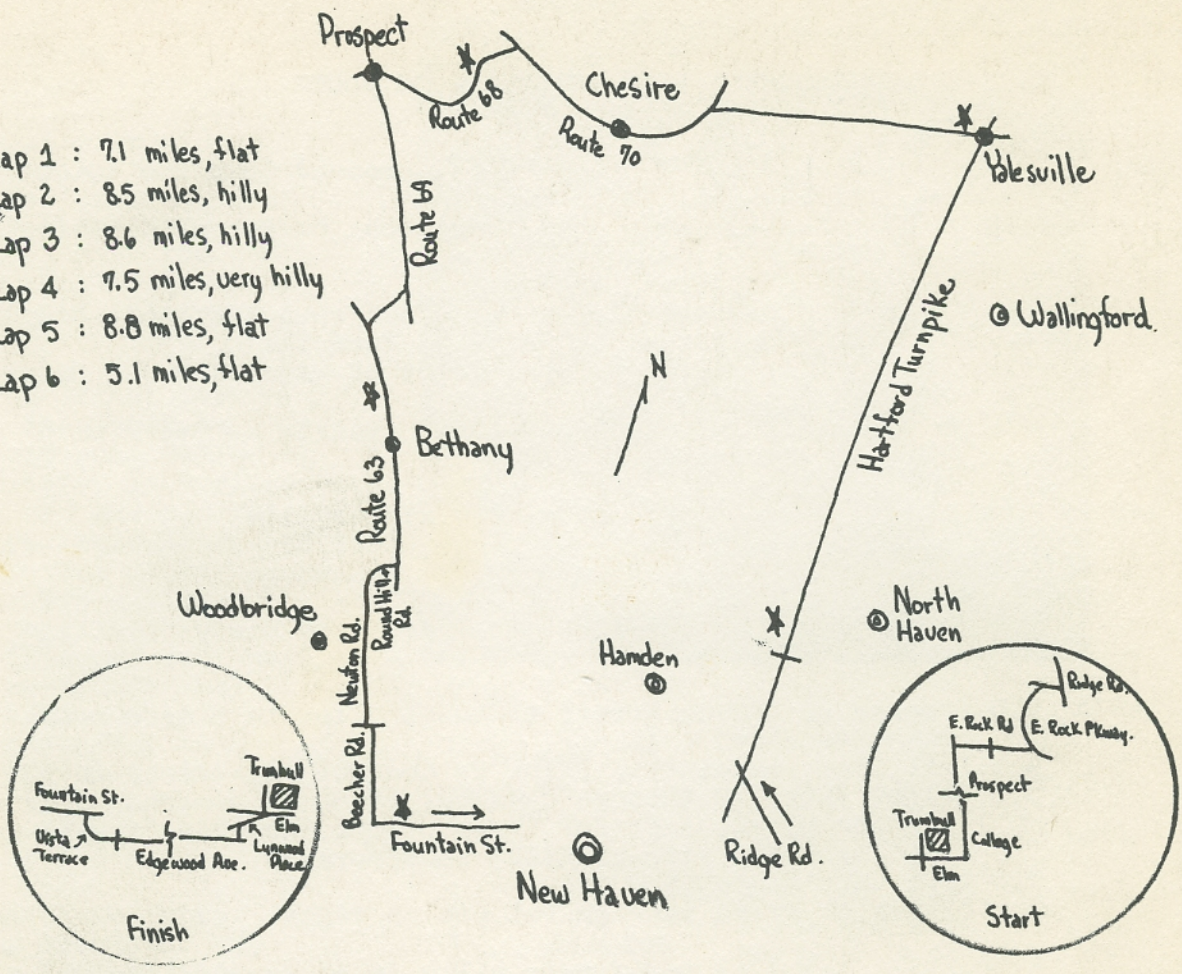
- Lap 5 0.0 proceed on Route 63
3.4 right onto Round Hill Road which becomes Newton Road
6.5 left onto Route 114 for one-half block, then right onto
Beecher Road
8.0 left onto Fountain Street at stop sign
8.8 finish of fifth lap---parking lot on left

comments: lap 5 is moderately hilly; traffic is light

- Lap 6 0.0 proceed on Fountain Street (caution: heavy city and resi-
dental traffic with semaphores and stops)
1.6 right at bottom of hill onto Vista Terrace which connects
into Edgewood; proceed on Edgewood
4.3 left on Lynwood Place for one block then right onto Elm
5.1 finish of sixth and final lap---York and Elm

comments: lap 6 is short and relatively flat; traffic is
heavy in city with semaphores and stops

- Lap 1 : 7.1 miles, flat
- Lap 2 : 8.5 miles, hilly
- Lap 3 : 8.6 miles, hilly
- Lap 4 : 7.5 miles, very hilly
- Lap 5 : 8.8 miles, flat
- Lap 6 : 5.1 miles, flat
